

Humanitarian Mission to Romania

February 20 -28 Cheerie Smith coordinated an unforgettable trip to visit four Romanian orphanages. Six Airline Ambassadors participated in this very intense experience. They soon realized that the medical supplies and donations they brought were but little compared to the immensity of the problems there. Each member of the team was shocked by the realities they witnessed, and newly grateful for the comforts and freedoms we take for granted.

There are as many orphanages in Romania as there are churches in the United States. Where did all these orphans come from? The former President of Romania, Ceausescu, wanted to raise a large army. He initiated a program demanding that every woman have at least five children. He also began to industrialize his country very

quickly without heed to environmental regulations. Due to poor nutrition, environmental toxins, and later, fallout from Chernobyl, many babies were born physically, emotionally or mentally handicapped. Families simply couldn't support children with special needs and they were abandoned. The strongest became "street children" living by their wits in the streets and sewers surrounding urban areas, others that survived, found their way to orphanages.

The team first visited an orphanage in remote NegruVoda. The countryside looked like something out of the "Hunchback of Notre Dame" with dilapidated horse drawn carriages punctuating the gray landscape. The orphanage consisted of 236 disabled children and had an official staff of three. The stench of unchanged diapers was overwhelming. There were simply not enough hands to attend to all of the children in need.

Surilda Hudson from Chicago felt faint at first.

Marty Sanders, SEA Regional Director began intuitively touching and loving every child that would respond. Each room held about 30 children, and some just sat rocking back and forth or banging their heads against the wall. Gary Shindler from LAX saw one tiny little girl staring into space. He could not get any response from her, and finally, very gently and lovingly he touched her palm. She could not muster the strength to respond in any other way, but her little palm opened up and pressed upwards, anxious for the touch of love.

The next stop was at a wonderful orphanage called Amurt, where Leeanne Hansen, LAX Regional Director had volunteered a few years ago. It is home for 16 boys, situated on two acres of land and is run by Buddhist monk named Dada. What a remarkable difference to see children who were well loved. A wonderful Romanian "Mama" cooked for the boys with delicious fresh vegetables from the garden outside. The boys attend school daily, help tend the garden and milk the cow. There was a river nearby for swimming and a house dog with a new litter of 7 pups. The team brought medical and school supplies and gave the boys colorful baseball hats that never left their heads the entire day!

The most emotional visit was to a facility north of Bucharest in Sasca, where Cheerie Smith had volunteered previously. It housed over 500 residents, most with mental deficiencies. Colleen Morey said it reminded her of "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest." Residents all had shaved heads to prevent lice. The group toured the wards giving out sweets. Many young adults of 19 or 20 appeared to be 7 or 8 years old. One little boy named Nico, with nothing more wrong with him than a club foot and hearing disorder, seemed to beg the team to help him escape from his "prison". But what could they do? Our group sadly wondered if their short visit had made any real difference, but residents followed them out to the truck as they left, hugging and smiling as if to say "Seeing you was the best of our day".

They also visited the Children's Relief Network, a haven for many of Bucharest's street children, founded by a remarkable American woman, Angie Thompson. This is an immense job, given that these children are used to living by their wits, stealing and sniffing glue. Still the hard work is making a difference in many of these young lives. Airline Ambassadors brought donations including recorders and musical instruments to delighted residents. We will continue aid to this project and assist in their the goal of building a Children's Village.

Change comes slowly to this country once suffocated by tyranny, but progress is being made and Airline Ambassadors will continue their help in Romania, channeling efforts towards projects with a real impact. Thank you so much to all the flight attendants who expressed interest in this trip. Contacts were initiated to begin escorting for an Adoption Agency there and if you are interested in another humanitarian mission please let your Regional Director know. Our touch, our hugs and our love are always needed.

Reflections on Romania, by Colleen Morey

Dear Airline Ambassadors....my dear new friends in adventure. For that is truly what we experienced during our week together... an adventure in the human spirit. I am experiencing my world through eyes which do not see as I had prior to our arrival on Romanian soil where our lives became immersed with those of the little ones we discovered there.

At the train station in Bucharest we were greeted with blue skies, brilliant sunshine, and a six year old sewer boy who called himself Odie. His weak voice and broken English serenaded us with a repertoire of songs he hoped to exchange for coins or candy. Gradually his "choral backup" appeared - an ensemble of young teens respirating into plastic bags lined with glue....the "glue" of sewer children - used to suppress hunger.

We traveled on to the impoverished and remote town of Negru Voda and checked in for the night. The "hotel" challenged my every source of comfort - from the heatless room and soiled sheets to the frigid shower where a rubber grate separated our feet from the saturation, centipedes, and millipedes. Garbed in my outer wear, hat, and boots, I climbed between the unlaundered sheets and bed clothes.... and silently prayed for warmth, for comfort, for sustenance. I prayed to make it through the week until I could return to the warmth and softness of my own bed. It was all about ME ...comfort for me, warmth for me, escape for me...

But what about little Odie, living in a sewer, who would never know a room like this, would never know the comfor of bed, a blanket, or even a frigid shower. His memory haunted and shamed me. I realized the two of us would lay our heads down for that night - my head would be resting on a pillow, and his would be on a sewer pipe... he would not have a blanket to draw over his weary, hungry body at the end of his countless hours of begging, and, the few insects crawling in our bathroom were nothing compared to rodents which shared Odie's "bedroom". I would be returning at the end of the week to a warm, soft home and bed. When Odie's week was over, he would be..... well, maybe he wouldn't be...at all.

Our next few days would introduce us to children lined in rows in rooms where they were trapped within their autistic rhythms and twisted bodies which would forever prevent them from the freedoms of the world I have come so accustomed to...of walking at will, or running, and chatting at will, or listening, of reading or dancing or singing, of choosing to eat, or not to.

My words do not suffice to describe the injustices my heart has witnessed. And yet, for the few hours we were there, they could dream..... through our eyes, or our touch, or our word, or our hugs....about that wonderment that exists beyond the prison of their circumstances. We will be nurtured eternally with a spirit of love, of strength, of hope...and a belief that dreams do come true.

Thank you to my team - Cheerie, Leeanne, Marty, Surilda, and Gary - for this most remarkable, life-changing awakening...and for who I am tonight as I write this letter....love, Colleen


Sequoia Symposium

Kids Konnection in DC, by Iren Logan




Kids Konnection Kids

Ismael, Oh Ismael, by Nancy Waller

I arrived at Newark Airport, feeling a little nervous, at 5:15 am, one day after my forty-seventh birthday. This is where I was to meet Joseph Skrobala, the host father, and Ismael, a two-year-old boy from Santo Domingo. As I searched for them, I worried if this baby would accept me, a complete stranger, and allow me to take him in my arms and care for him for the next six hours, as I escorted him back to his homeland.

I saw a tall, gentle looking man holding the cutest little boy. The boy was unable to walk at all, after the surgery to fix both his feet. Ismael was so sleepy that he allowed me to hold him the moment I put my arms out. As I boarded the flight I thought how hard this must be for Joseph and his wife Kathleen who had been caring for him for six months as one of their own.

After takeoff, Ismael began looking around, smiling an infectious smile and discovering how the window shade worked and the light turned on and off. Soon he tired and took his first of many small naps. He wouldn't leave my arms for even a second. I hugged and kissed him many times during the flight, and he would tap my arm and say "Ma".

Changing planes in San Juan, I was helped by loving flight attendants and agents who knew that we were part of Airline Ambassadors International. This was my first trip escorting for the organization, and felt proud and special to be entrusted with carrying a precious child home.

In Santo Domingo I cleared customs and walked outside with Ismael's arms still wrapped around my neck. I knew his mother was somewhere in this crowd and could only imagine her emotions as she waited to greet her tiny son who had been away so long, enduring hospitals and medicines without her.

It was then I heard a faint whisper behind me calling, "Ismael, oh Ismael!" I turned and carefully handed the baby over to his mother, whose eyes were filled with joy. Sadly, tears ran down Ismael's cheeks and he screamed to come back to me. He was confused by the crowd, and had been

away from his mother and didn't understand who she was! I wiped my own tears away, knowing that all would soon be well and felt both happy and sad that my job was completed. Ismael did more for me than I could have for him. The love I felt in my heart will be a memory that I shall treasure forever. What a wonderful birthday gift this had been.

A Day in the Life, by Margaret Whitehead

Coordinating almost 200 escorts per year is no small feat. Here is a behind the scenes look at a typical night for Margaret Whitehead, our Escort Coordinator. She has coordinated 35 escorts so far this year.

Monday evening, just before 7 p.m., I sit down with my Escort checklist. There are three escort trips scheduled to three different countries in the next three days, with one more phone call and one more fax. I should be finished, and able to watch the American Music Awards on TV. Alexander Wahl, who is flying down to Quito, Ecuador tomorrow night to escort a child to Miami Wednesday morning, needs to give me a fax number for his paperwork. The phone rings. It is Colleen Brenner, the escort for a child from Guatemala City to Miami tomorrow. She is in bed with the flu. After reassuring her that we will cover the trip, she promises not to worry and to seek medical attention.

The little girl has a vital doctor's appointment in Chicago on Wednesday so she <u>must</u> travel tomorrow! I begin calling other volunteers, leaving about 25 messages before I reach Shelly Mullins. She can't go to Guatemala, but she begins to make calls on my behalf. She finally locates Lori Ervin, one of the flight attendants working the flight from Guatemala to Miami, who volunteers her time to meet the child's parents in the Guatemala airport, take her on board the aircraft, and after the flight, assist her through customs and immigration in Miami and take her to meet Marni. Perfect!



Meanwhile, Teri Martin calls from Las Vegas to confirm her escort trip to Cali, Columbia on Wednesday. She will fly down to Cali and escort a two-year-old back to Miami on Thursday. She agrees to meet Alexander in the airport, and take "his" little girl with them to Chicago, so that Alexander can continue home to New York City to work the next day.

At 10:00 p.m., Alexander calls and I fax him his papers. The phone rings again! A child needs to be escorted to Haiti in two weeks. Then the calls begin from all the escorts who had received my desperate messages earlier. I assure them that we have solved the problem of escorts for the next three days and thank them for their dedication. Finally, I watch the last ten minutes of the Music Awards program uninterrupted.

People often ask me why I continue to do this volunteer work since it is so time consuming. But really, I don't mind the nights spent on the telephone. Since I no longer work for an airline and can't make these trips myself, I feel that I am still contributing by arranging these trips for others. When put into the proper perspective, these problems are unimportant when compared to the future of a child. Without the help of so many caring people, most of these children would be condemned to a life of pain and suffering. Yet, with our combined efforts, these little ones are given

Gloria's Story

Each of our escorts is indeed a life changing experience for the child involved. Occasionally we are asked to bring an orphan to meet his new family for the first time. The child we are escorting may be receiving a life saving operation or surgery that will allow him to see or to walk or to live a normal life. Great sensitivity and compassion is needed by Airline Ambassador escorts in caring for these precious little ones for the time they are entrusted to us.



Gloria Reid, Regional Director for DFW is very familiar with dealing with children. A mother of three herself she also supervised church nursery's for several years. Little children just gravitate to her loving and nurturing manner.

"I speak softly and never over-stimulate the children, "she said, "what they need more than anything is a quiet place to rest. I gently let them come to me." Gloria recounts the story of little 10-year-old Obil she escorted from Grand Rapids to his home in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, after his surgery....

Gloria let Obil sit by the window while she quietly sat in the aisle seat. They exchanged smiles and after a while she heard his shy little voice say "You nice lady." She turned and looked at little Obil sideways and answered gently "I heard you." Embarrassed, he looked out the window as his face turned red, but even his brown little fingers could not cover a beautiful smile. "Would you like me to sit by you?" she continued. Little Obil beamed at her invitation and spent the rest of the trip nestled against her. "You never forget these children," Gloria said, "you hold them in your heart forever."

"Now what clinic will receive these donations?" asked the man from AA Freight in DTW. It was Friday, March 13 and Linda Gansler had just delivered 17 big boxes bound for a hospital in Bogota. "I'll tell you in a minute, Linda groaned breathlessly, "as soon as this contraction stops." Linda's baby was due but even though her labor had already begun she wanted to get this shipment going!

Linda, who works with Family Adoption Consultants near Detroit, has been assisting Airline Ambassadors coordinate donations of medical supplies from University of Michigan Hospital. Once a month, American Airlines has generously offered to assist us with shipping via AA Freight. This month, we shipped two major shipments from DTW one day apart. Linda insisted she was able to manage getting the boxes sorted, weighed and measured and delivered to the airport with help from her husband Karl and other friends. Her dedication is awesome. Little Autumn Nicole was born on Sunday, March 15, weighing 8lbs, 6oz.

Goodwill Ambassador for D.C. School

Irene Logan personally escorted 30 boxes (484 lbs. of donated school and art supplies, clothing and toys) to the Nuestros Pequenos Hermanos Orphanage in Honduras. Colleen Morey, Program Coordinator for Arch Schools is inspired by the power of these projects to raise self esteem and perk the enthusiasm and initiative of students. She believes Arch Schools could be a model for Airline Ambassadors work with a national school outreach program. We have already begun working with a school in DC and become a "Dade" Partner in Miami working to link schools and community. Airline Ambassadors hosted a dynamic Press Conference at the U.N. on February 12, to launch the 1998 Youth Art/ Essay Competition - "Traveling to Make a Difference".

Nancy Rivard, President of Airline Ambassadors welcomed the press and introduced H.E. Inocencio Arias, Ambassador of Spain, Mr. Joaquin Antuna, President of Paz y Cooperacion and Mr. Felipe Luciano, NY media celebrity. "Traveling to make a difference, she explained, "is the theme behind Airline Ambassadors activities." We hope to inspire and involve the traveling public in our programs. We take particular joy in promoting this competition to school children in the United States and around the world."



U.N. Press Conference

Joaquin Antuna unveiled a colorful poster describing the contest. It is entitled *The Right to Travel in a World with-out Frontiers - Traveling to Make a Difference*. It depicts a huge bird, a rising Phoenix, flying over the earth with many happy youngsters on its back. The back of the poster describes the contest in detail and explains the age groups and categories. 15,000 posters were printed in five languages and will be distributed by the World Tourism Organization and Airline Ambassadors. Paz y Cooperacion will again serve as the Secretariat for the competition.

Mr. Antuna pointed out the "Right to Travel" is supported in Articles 13 and 24 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the 50th Anniversary of which is being celebrated this year.

Nancy described Airline Ambassadors plans to actively promote the competition with personal visits to schools in nine major U.S. cities. She thanked American Airlines for providing Grand Prize tickets for winners to attend Award Ceremonies in Madrid on World Tourism Day in Spetember,

and announced Airline Ambassadors plans to coordinate a National Award Ceremony at the United States Congress.

Felipe Luciano mesmerized the crowd with a riveting series of questions that helped everyone to see the importance of travel as a basis for understanding, friendship and global peace. "What would happen if a kid from Harlem could visit the Middle East without being behind an M1 tank - without having an "us" and "them" but seeing us all as part of the global community? Do you think we would go to war?" Ambassador Arias was very supportive and even signed up as a dues paying Airline Ambassador at the end of the meeting!

26 Airline Ambassadors attended, including a team of students and teachers from Arch school. Many thanks to Sharrye Moore and Christina Anderson who organized an interesting day for all. The group met for a morning briefing on the competition, shared lunch at the Delegates Dining Room, attended the Press Conference, listened to a short talk by Elaine Valdoff, Chair of the NGO Executive Committee and discussed global youth outreach.
