Blessings for Bosnia

Rae England led a group of 14 Airline Ambassadors on an unprecedented trip through Central Bosnia in late April to assist some of the 35,000 children who have lost their parents or who are handicapped as a result of the war. Rae, a DFW F/A has an organization called Love in Action which has been assisting this war torn region for the last 6 years. The trip to five cities in five days was planned by retired General Jovan Divjak of Sarajevo and Love in Action. A trip that changed the life of those who went.

Retired General Jovan Divjak, a real hero in Bosnia, led us through a rigorous schedule in order to see the needs of children in post-war Bosnia. It is not possible to put into words the impact these children have had on our lives as we listened to their stories. Over and over again we saw the power of love as an aunt, grandmother or neighbor put their arms around these children and nurtured them

through their tragedy. We were shocked by the horror of crimes against innocent people, especially children, in the name of war, and amazed by the goodness of others.

CHILDREN WITHOUT PARENTS

We visited five cities on this trip, Bihac, Mostar, Zenica, Sarajevo and Tuzla. At each stop we spent time with families who are foster parenting children without parents. We saw families in such need it is hard to comprehend how hard their life is. We met people broken by grief. Grandmothers cried and shook uncontrollably while their sons and daughters told their particular story. We visited several orphanages where we saw loving caretakers doing the best they can with limited resources.

SCHOOLS

Tears rushed to my eyes when we walked into one school in Bihac. The children smiled and greeeted us as if all was normal. More tiles were missing from the floor than were left, and those were only pieces. Walls needed repair and paint, Windows

needed to be replaced and the heat came from a tiny stove in a corner. Three principles of schools in this condition spent the day with us. Their love for the children was evident and they will not let us forget the need.

REFUGEES

Refugees are the forgotten people of Bosnia. Many remain in refugee camps without jobs or basic nutrition. Men hobble around without a prosthesis that could greatly enhance their quality of life. One refugee couple insisted I visit their 26 year old daughter. She had been hit by a grenade and the father had fled with her on his back. She recovered from her physical injuries, but so traumatic was her experience that she has been unable to eat solid food or leave her room since then. When I touched her shoulder, it seemed her frail little body was vibrating. These parents have lost their child as surely as if she were dead.

SREBRENICA

It is estimated that 10,500 were killed in a massacre in Srebrenica when thousands of innocent people were murdered in July of 1995 because of ethnic and religious prejudice. Our last stop was at a camp for victims of this tragedy. We entered a meeting room full of Muslim refugees waiting to hear from us. I was the last to speak.

"In 1993 I went to Sarajevo to try and find ways to bring food into Bosnia," I explained. "I am a Christian, but that trip was paid for by a Muslim couple and I worked with many Muslim organizations while there. One evening we sat late into the night by candlelight plotting ways to get food into Bosnia. We talked of the many sad situations of the war. Then the Arabic Muslim man I was with said an extraordinary thing. "Truly, you are my sister." After my talk a man approached me and said, "I teach religion here at this refugee camp. If I do not see you again here, I expect to see you in heaven."

CONCLUSION

There were some tense moments on our trip, especially as we drove through central Bosnia. For miles there was a ghostly absence of life as we drove past beautiful villages where no one lived. These villages belong to one ethnic group and are controlled by another who will not allow them to return. We were the only car on the road and graves were visible throughout the countryside - temporary graves heaped up with gravel as if waiting for families to come claim them.

How can the voice of reason ever prevail in a place where many have stooped to the worst that they can be? We met wonderful people on the trip, who, because of extraordinary acts of courage and kindness, give hope to us all. Our group touched upon the answer it seems. Fourteen flight attendants flew standby on oversold flights, paid for their own expenses and took time off to help Bosnia's children. General Jovan Divjak who is Serb is

well known in Bosnia as a man who paid a high price to do what is right. He left the Yugoslav Army in which he had served for 35 years to fight beside Muslims and Croats. And yet he is often rejected by those for whom he risked his very life. I am reminded of the writing in front of Mother Theresa's home:

People are unreasonable, illogical and self-centered.

Love them anyway

If you do good, people may accuse you of selfish motives.

Do good anyway.

If you are successful, you may win false friends and true enemies.

Succeed anyway.

The good you do today may be forgotton tommorrow.

Do good anyway.

Honesty and transparency make you vulnerable.

Be honest and transparent anyway.

What you spend years building may be detroyed overnight.

Build anyway.

People who really want help may attack you if you help them.

Help them anyway.

ur Children's Escort Program continues to grow, with several new agencies now using our volunteer services. So far in 1998 we have made over150 escort trips. The majority of trips have been to Santo Domingo, Tegucigalpa, Cali and Guatemala City. However *there have been several trips to Ethiopia and even Latvia and Sweden. Every trip we make is special in its own way. Yet a few stand out in my mind as being extraordinary.

Brenda Givens, on her very first escort trip got more than she bargained for when she brought little Hugo from Guatemala. We had been told that he would have surgery for a congenital hand deformity and a cleft lip and palate. This sounded easy enough for a new escort. Then Brenda had to change a diaper enroute. What a shock when she discovered that Hugo had also had a colostomy! She handled the matter quite professionally and was surprised when a nearby passenger pulled out a \$100 bill and presented it to her. He was impressed with our work and asked that his donation be used to help other children in need.

Then there is Herby. This little charmer from Haiti, born without ears, now proudly shows off his new set of ears crafted from his own cartilage! He is now in Atlanta, preparing for surgery that will allow him to hear for the very first time.

Cheerie Smith and Laura Latham did their very own mini-airlift in July as they took 6 kids, healthy and happy back home to Santo Domingo. They began their journey in Newark with 5 of the kids. In Miami they rendevoued with Sue Thomas who brought Danny from Detroit to join them for the last leg of his trip home.

*Miami based pilot, Kevin Smith made the long and grueling trip to Ethiopia and brought home 8 kids to their new adoptive parents. 5 of these kids were under 2yrs old. Kevin had the entire entourage to feed, change and entertain! Then he had to connect in Frankfurt, the halfway point in their journey. This in itself makes me shudder to imagine. I still remember escorting from Korea with lots of babies and lots of carry on and having to change planes and clear customs. Believe me, it is NOT EASY! The day after their arrival home Kevin called to say he would gladly go back to Ethiopia any time. We truly need more like him.

Recently John Cushman and Margarita Bergthaler also traveled to Ethiopia where they stayed for 5 days helping at the orphanage and distributing medical supplies. They escorted little 5 yr. old Tsega on the biggest

Ambassadors to the Needy



Airline Ambassadors co-hosted a workshop at the United Nations Youth International meeting last May. They invited young people to assist in soliciting donations for the Legion of Goodwill's charitable work in Brazil and promised to give youth representatives an experience of "traveling to make a difference" by bringing them on an actual mission.

"What do you think about your visit here?" I asked 18 yr. old Gibran later half expecting that he may complain about the tiring bus ride of the day. Gibran looked slowly up at me - his dark eyes glistening. "This trip" he said "has been the pivotal experience of my lifetime."

5 Airline Ambassadors and 4 young people traveled to Brazil August 10 -17th. We had coordinated the donation and shipment of 6,000 lbs of medical supplies and clothing to assist the Legion of Goodwill but were unprepared for what we would encounter.

Bright lights of TV cameras met us upon arrival in Sao Paulo and followed us throughout the visit. By the end of the week we all felt like celebrities. But the real celebrity was the Legion itself. Never in my

many years of travel have I seen such an example of unconditional love.

The Legion of Goodwill is one of the largest NGO's (Non-governmental Organization's) in Brazil. They support over 500 facilities such as schools, day care centers, orphanages and nursing homes throughout the country. They feed the hungry and heal the sick. Everything they do is of first class quality, undertaken

with genuine caring, love and joy. All of their services are offered free of charge. They have inspired over 100,000 people to work as volunteers.

Our group visited day care centers, schools and old folks homes in Rio and Sao Paulo. We joined the Legion in some of the worst favellas (slums) outlying Rio bringing warm and wholesome food to the families there. All facilities we toured were impeccably clean and beautiful. Each individual is cared about deeply and seems to blossom in the caring atmosphere. Children and employees greeted us with joyous songs and angelic voices. One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to the Legion's Temple in Brasilia built as a pyramid and honoring all spiritual paths.

One evening we looked out of our hotel in downtown Rio and saw 25 Legion volunteers on the street corner. They were feeding the homeless delicious organic food. They had set up a medical table to wash the feet and the wounds of the street people, and a makeshift barber shop to shave and give haircuts to the homeless. It wasn't just any shave or haircut they were given with such care and in the very latest styles. Husbands, wives 'grandmothers and children were among the volunteers. They had an inner radiance and happiness I had rarely seen. I

began to cry. Never in my life had I seen such selfless sharing and sincere happiness.

It was the same for Natalie Alhonte (15), Gerard Ameer (18) Martine Moore (17), and Korina Smith (15). The young people decided to volunteer next summer and teach English in Brazil. Whatever happens - their experiences will change their lives forever. We were happy to have Joan Beisel the President of United Youth International join us. Thank you so much to Susan Eckert who's donated D3 passes helped make this trip possible for them.

We are deeply grateful to Maria Malaman UN NGO representative for the Legion who coordinated the whole trip, to her sister Sondra and countless volunteers who hosted us and were there to meet our every need, who provided a beautiful bus and daily radio and television coverage of our mission. Special thanks to Mr. Paivo Netta, the President of the Legion and his lovely wife Luci who we had the privilege to meet.

Thank you to Sharrye Moore, the professional and loving Project Coordinator for the mission. I know our whole

Tony, Brad and Dick. But, unfortunately, due to political bureaucracy they were still in Customs. (There are many angels working on this issue) So it was on to plan B.

The next day Dennis Estes and Mark Jawers went downtown and bought paint. For the next 4 days we painted the home where most of the children slept, as well as a few staff members...a project 20 years overdue. Korina, our 15 year old, painted a fabulous beach scene mural in the hall. (We all felt compelled to add our own little touches to commemorate the visit.) It was quite a collaboration and we worked extra hard to make up for the boxes not showing up. We laughed so much with the children and with one another during the project. It gave us a sense of accomplishment and bonded us so much more because we cared about them and their home. Granted it wasn't a toy that would soon break or an article of clothing that would be soiled, torn or grown out of and forgotten. It was a team effort of LOVE from the heart, they knew it and we knew it and we came away with a renewed spirituality, a closer bond of friendship with each other and our new found friends and knowing we made a little difference in these precious lives. So in the end we got back so much more than we gave.

World Congress of Adventure Tourism Mission to Ecuador

6 Airline Ambassadors traveled to Quito to participate at the World Congress of Adventure Tourism and to lay the foundation for continuing humanitarian work in Ecuador.

Sharon Ochoa and Nancy Rivard met the Vice President of Ecuador at the opening reception and solicited his full support in releasing 52 boxes of donated medical supplies from Customs!

The group skipped the Congress one day and joined Dr. Fernando Ortega to learn about the Community Health and Development Program (CH&D) which he directs and to which Airline Ambassadors has been sending donations.

He gave a short tour of the University San Franciso de Quito highlighting a van used as a "traveling clinic" and his hope to equip it with basic medical equipment for his volunteer work with the rural poor. He also took the group to a 15 bed hospital in Yaruqui, where they comforted the sick and noted the need

for medical donations.

The most touching part of the day was the visit to the Tababela School in the tiny village of Ceum. The school and day care center caters to 45 children of primary school ages and houses 6 children from the Amazon Achuar tribe. They were delighted to receive visitors. The Ambassadors gave candy to the children and distributed donations they had brought. 50 T-shirts, baby and children's clothes (donated by Mike, Sue and Joseph Albers) as well as coloring books paper and pencils (brought by Jim and Marge Casey) .

The school decided that the T-shirts would be used as part of the Tababela school uniform! The school charges only \$2.00 per month per child. Until this donation there has not been enough money available to provide uniforms.

At the World Congress of Adventure Tourism Mike Albers and James Casey (Cochairs of the AA's Volunteer Environmental AdvisoryCommittee (VEAC) presented on AA's environmental commitment, corporate volunteerism and the VEAC program and children's art competition. Nancy Rivard introduced the Airline

Ambassador program and identified an emerging market niche as "traveling to make a difference" to a receptive audience.
