

A Life Changing Experience For American Airlines VPs

Visiting a garbage dump, refugee camp, or poor children's project can be a real adventure. That's what American Airlines' VP-DFW Tim Ahern and VP-MIA George Hazy found during a recent mission to Quito, Ecuador. Tim commented that his visit to families living at the dump was a life-changing experience. "When you see such poverty, you are amazed that the people can be so happy just to receive a pair of used jeans, a rain jacket, or a baseball cap," Tim said. Later, at an indigenous children's project at a squatter community, the team shared smiles and laughter brought on simply by helping children make butterflies from coffee filters and clothes pegs. Children living in poverty don't play or receive attention from caring adults. Life is difficult without electricity, running water, or even food, and there is no luxury of leisure playtime.



Simply spending time with these children, showing them care, helps to build their self-esteem and is an experience they will remember for the rest of their lives. Tim himself looks forward to joining another AAI mission and plans to bring his wife and son. Both AA executives encourage American Airlines employees and all Americans to travel to make a difference through Airline Ambassadors International. It will make for an unforget-table memory!

Our volunteers are often surprised by the overwhelming kindness and "royal treatment" received from start to finish on a mission. Philanthropy Magazine Joins AAI on a Mission of the Heart

30b Hopkins, President of Philanthropy International Magazine, bined an adventurous mission to the mountains of Guatemala - a far different world than his normal day-to-day life. He taught 350 Mayan children to brush their teeth and wash their hands and later helped deliver promised wheelchairs to a remote adobe village outside the Quiche Indian market of Chichicastenango. En route, the van created quite a stir, piled high with wheelchairs, as volunteers tossed balloons out the windows to eager children. The van bumped to a pullover spot around winding curves and dusty unpaved roads, where the team then trekked through the forest with their donations. Reaching the top, they were able to deliver a wheelchair to 14-year old Marta Elena, who until then had been unable to get around unless carried on her parents backs. A sec-

ond wheelchair just happened to be available for her sister, 3-year old Marta Isabel. With 10 strangers crowded around her speaking languages she did not



understand, little Marta burst out crying. A stuffed animal was quickly produced to ease her fear and bring back her smile, then she too was presented with the gift of mobility that would better her life immeasurably. It was an incredible week [in terms of the mission itself]," Scott declared. The team of 13, led by Deborah Quigley, provided hundreds of children's books and funds for Khmer musical instruments for an orphanage of former street children in Phnom Penh, as well as life saving medicines for a children's hospital in Angor Wat. On the wedding day the whole team witnessed the beautiful Buddhist ceremony, and each tied a piece of string around the couple's wrists – a symbol akin to the rings exchanged in many nuptials. The ceremony added a special touch to a special week of magic. For Airline Ambassadors, this is a first!


A Little Fresh Paint Goes A Long Way
